Breaking ground

On 12th March, we will be holding a 'ground-breaking' event to mark the beginning of the building of the <u>Alice de Rothschild Sixth Form Centre.</u> We expect to be able to begin using the building in January, 2025.

Safer Internet Use – some sobering statistics

According to the Government's Online Data Initiative, 62% of adult internet users and **over 80% of children** (aged 12-15) have had potentially harmful experiences online. Research from the NSPCC estimates:




Now, more than ever, it is vital that you open your eyes to the potentially damaging impact of social media on your child's mental health – whatever their age. Talking about content, being included in a group and restricting phone use in the evening, as well as having a family rule to keep phones out of bedrooms, will all enable you to better safeguard your child.

We address Internet Safety in PSHE lessons and in assembly, but education at school needs to be supported by your active engagement at home. One way you could do this would be to share the information above and discuss how to block or report any unwanted messages.

In addition, we hope that the information here will help you to protect your child from the significant risks posed by unfettered access to the Internet.







Attendance Information

Attendance in school every day remains one of the most important parnerships between home and school. Year 7, 8 and 12 are leading the rest of the students with the highest levels of attendance.

While our Persistent Absence levels for Waddesdon are below the national averages, every child's education matters and so, if attendance dips below 90% (i.e. more than one day of absence a fortnight), then it may be that you need our support. Our attendance officer, Mrs Ackerlay, is on hand to provide assistance, as are Form Tutors and Heads of Year.

WHS What to do if you have symptoms of COVID-19 and other sickness

S.T.O.P. Bullying

Dignity, kindness and respect are the key words that underpin our school's Christian Values. We strive to create a safe and happy environment, believing that all bullying is unacceptable, and should not be tolerated.



Underpinning our bullying policy is the acronym S.T.O.P. SEVERAL TIMES ON PURPOSE. Bullying is defined as the repetitive, intentional harming of one person or group by another person or group, where the relationship involves an imbalance of power.

Year 11 Food students will have their final NEA2 assessment during week commencing 26th February. This involves preparing and cooking three dishes in three hours. They will need to practise the dishes over half term, ready to produce their best work ever.

Year 13 will be in the following week, 4th March. They need to prepare three courses in three and a half hours.

Art GCSE help day: Friday 12th April (Easter holidays)

We are holding a GCSE help day in the Easter holidays for all Year 11 GCSE students studying Art, Graphics or Photography. This day is designed to support students with their final preparations in advance of the exams which start shortly after we return from the holiday.

Students need to attend the full day between 9am and 3pm. They do not need to wear uniform but do need to bring a packed lunch, a drink, and a snack.

Plagiarism – exam requirements and exam malpractice

At this time of year, many students are completing Non-examined assessments (NEAs) for their GCSE, A Level and BTec courses. As part of this, they may be required to complete their own independent research.

It is vital that students are aware of the importance of correctly referencing sources as required by the exam specifications. Failure to acknowledge sources, or incorrect referencing, could be considered 'exam malpractice' and lead to a loss of marks or disqualification.



Students have been given detailed advice from subject teachers about the correct methods to use. If they are unsure of the correct methods, they should speak with their teacher.

According to the Joint Council of Qualifications, "Plagiarism involves taking someone else's words, thoughts or ideas and trying to pass them off as your own. It is a form of cheating which is taken very seriously".

Before submitting NEA work, students are required to sign the declaration of authentication to confirm that the work submitted is their own. If plagiarism is detected after this has been signed, the case must be reported to the exam board.

The Use of AI

AI use refers to the use of AI tools to obtain information and content which might be used in work produced for assessments which lead towards qualifications.

The use of AI chatbots may pose significant risks if used by students completing qualification assessments. Students must submit work for assessments which is their own. This means both ensuring that the final product is in their own words, and isn't copied or paraphrased from another source such as an AI tool, and that the content reflects their own independent work.

Any use of AI which means students have not independently demonstrated their own attainment is likely to be considered malpractice.

Examples of AI misuse include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Copying or paraphrasing sections of AI-generated content so that the work is no longer the student's own
- Copying or paraphrasing whole responses of AI-generated content
- Using AI to complete parts of the assessment so that the work does not reflect the student's own work, analysis, evaluation or calculations
- Failing to acknowledge use of AI tools when they have been used as a source of information
- Incomplete or poor acknowledgement of AI tools
- Submitting work with intentionally incomplete or misleading references or bibliographies.

Parental Support

At this time, we ask all parents/carers to be vigilant if their son/daughter is completing NEA research at home. If they are using AI chatbots or copying and pasting work from online sources, this could lead to their loss of marks or disqualification from the exam.




