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Our commitment to action and improvement in race equality

Waddesdon School has been recognised for our commitment to improving race equality and prioritising an inclusive culture where staff, students, parents and partners of all ethnicities are equally valued, by being awarded the Gold level RACE Charter Mark.



Developed by SSAT (the Schools, Students and Teachers network) and Fig Tree International, the Race and Conscious Equality (RACE) Charter Mark is for UK schools, academies and colleges, in both the state and private sectors, who wish to demonstrate their commitment to action and improvement in relation to race equality in all aspects of their work as educators, employers and community leaders.

Since achieving the Silver Charter Mark in 2022, we have used the Charter Mark framework to conduct a thorough review of practice and implemented more actions. We re-submitted an evaluation detailing our work towards equality so far and ambitious plans for RACE going forward.

Supporting homework – Period 6



Research tells us that independent learning matters and, as a school, we value the place of meaningful homework and structured revision. For example, you can't become proficient in French or Spanish without regularly learning vocabulary and reviewing grammar at home.

Students who fail to complete three or more homework tasks over a two-

week period are entered into our Period 6 after-school support sessions (in the first instance for four sessions, increasing in number for students who continue to struggle meeting homework deadlines). We ask that parents support their children by supporting us, if your child is unable to complete work at home.

We also run a voluntary after school homework club Monday to Thursday which all students are welcome to attend.

Homework is seen as one of the principal ways in which student achievement can be raised and it is important that homework is valued, so that it becomes routine. We believe the responsibility for completing homework in the first instance comes from the students themselves, alongside parents who may help provide structure and routine.



Year 11 Mock Exam Revision and Information

It has been so impressive to hear how many Year 11s have already started the revision and preparation process for their Mock Exams this December. We will be holding an information

evening for students, parents and carers on Thursday 24th October at 6.30pm. Please look out for a separate letter with further information.

S.T.O.P. Bullying



Dignity, kindness and respect underpin our school's values. We are about creating a safe and happy environment, part of which means that all bullying is unacceptable, and should not be tolerated.

Our bullying policy uses the acronym S.T.O.P. (SEVERAL TIMES ON PURPOSE). Bullying is defined as the repetitive, intentional harming of one person or group by another person or group, where the relationship involves an imbalance of power.

Bullying can be: emotional, physical, verbal, written, cyber, sexual, prejudice-based and discriminatory. For more information please look at our <u>policy</u>.

The NHS advises that people "stay at home and avoid contact with other people **if** you or your child have symptoms and either:

- have a high temperature (38C or above)
- do not feel well enough to go to work, school, childcare, or do your normal activities

You can go back to your normal activities when you feel better or do not have a high temperature. If your child has mild symptoms such as a runny nose, sore throat or mild cough, and they feel well enough, they can go to school or childcare."

"You are no longer required to do a COVID-19 rapid lateral flow test if you have symptoms. But if you or your child have tested positive for COVID-19:

 try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 3 days after the day the test was taken if you or your child are under 18 years old – children and young people tend to be infectious to other people for less time than adults try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 5 days after the day you took your test if you are 18 years old or over."

How to look after COVID-19 symptoms yourself (NHS advice)

"It's not always possible to treat COVID-19. But there are things you can do to help ease some of the symptoms, such as a high temperature, a cough and breathlessness.

Do

- get lots of rest
- drink plenty of water to avoid dehydration (your pee should be light yellow or clear)
- take <u>paracetamol</u> or <u>ibuprofen</u> if you feel uncomfortable
- try having a teaspoon of honey if you have a cough do not give honey to babies under 12 months
- try turning the heating down or opening a window to help with breathlessness
- breathe slowly in through your nose and out through your mouth, with your lips together like you're gently blowing out a candle
- sit upright in a chair to help with breathlessness
- relax your shoulders, so you're not hunched to help with breathlessness
- lean forward slightly support yourself by putting your hands on your knees or on something stable like a chair to help with breathlessness

Don't

- do not lie on your back if you have a cough lie on your side or sit upright instead
- do not use a fan to cool your room as it may spread the virus
- try not to panic if you're feeling breathless this can make it worse"



The Medical Room

At Waddesdon, we have a Medical Room open during the school day (8am until 3.30pm) for our students. It is staffed by either the First Aid Officer or the School Nurse.

If students become unwell during the school day, we will care for them and contact you and, if needed, appropriate emergency services, hence it is really important that parents/carers provide us with sufficient and up to date information about any medical needs.

Medication: we stock paracetamol (500mg) and paracetamol suspension (250mg/5mls) which we can give to students as appropriate, as long as we have parental consent to do so. It is given between the times of 12.30 - 1pm. This is to allow 4 hours since arriving at school in case students have had any painkiller medication in the morning at home, and then 4 hours to elapse before arriving home when they may safely take another dose. Outside this half hour, we would contact a parent/carer to confirm no medication had been taken or will be given within 4 hours.

We do not stock ibuprofen (Nurofen, Calprofen) as the current NHS guidance (link below) advises this is not suitable for many children. We also do not stock antihistamine medication as there are so many different varieties available. In addition, this can be given once a day at home if it is taken for hayfever.

Microsoft Microsoft Office for all

Every student at Waddesdon School has free access to Microsoft Office products while they are a student at the school. Access to the software is provided and authenticated through their school email address.

In a browser, navigate to <u>www.office.com</u> and select the option to **Sign in**. Your child will then sign in using their email address and password. Once they have signed in, they can click the **Install and more** button on the top right to install the software onto their machine. This process can be repeated on up to five different devices within the household.

Please note that this software is authenticated using your child's email address. If the email authentication is removed after the software has been installed, access to the software will stop. After your child leaves Waddesdon School, their email will be disabled and access to the software will stop. All files and documents will still remain, but you will have to obtain another licence to use the software.



Locker Usage

We get frequent requests from students asking for access to a friend's locker, usually to get their PE kit out because the friend is absent or if they can't find them.

We remind them that lockers are not to be shared (unless this has been requested and each student has his/her own key).

If you think that this is something that your child needs to know, please can you remind them that they must not use another student's locker, nor allow another student to use their locker.

Thank you so much for coping with the travel disruption caused by the rain and roadworks recently. We appreciate that it has been a challenging start and end to many students' and families' days.


Last week, we shared the following information, so you are aware of the A41 diversion which takes the traffic from Aylesbury into Waddesdon.

If coming from Aylesbury, you come along the A41 as normal, passing the Miller & Carter at Aylesbury Vale Parkway, then go under the bridge. You continue along the A41 until you reach the HS2 roundabout, **turn right at the roundabout** (*it is currently signposted Quainton & Whitchurch, and will be updated with Waddesdon soon*). When you reach the end of the road, turn left at the new roundabout which leads you into Waddesdon village.



If you are coming down Waddesdon Hill, turn right onto the A41 and then take the first exit left at the HS2 roundabout. You then turn left at the new roundabout and this will lead you into Waddesdon village.

We will update parents/carers as soon as we have any further information.



The late bus is now up and running! We encourage our students to take advantage of it so that they can take part in extra-curricular activities (see <u>website</u>) and also if they need to catch up on, or complete work.

The routes are outlined below:

Route 1: Westcott, Ashendon, Upper Winchendon, Quainton (The Green), Pitchcott, Oving (Bowling Alley), North Marston (Pilgrim PH), Whitchurch (on request), Hardwick (on request)

Route 2: Kingswood, Grendon Underwood (all stops if required), Springhill (prison), Edgcott, Calvert (Green), Charndon (on request), Marsh Gibbon The Plough (on request), Ludgershall Village Hall (on request)

The buses will return to their depots in Aylesbury and so the bus company (Motts) have also indicated that they would be happy to drop students to a central point in Aylesbury, if required.

Both buses will leave school at 4.35pm, with the longest journey time taking approximately 45 minutes.

National Curriculum and Assessment Review

Last week, the Government launched a curriculum and assessment review. According to the Department for Education it will "look closely at the key challenges to attainment for young people, and the barriers which hold children back from the opportunities and life chances they deserve – in particular those who are socioeconomically disadvantaged, or with special educational needs or disabilities (SEND)."

The review is seeking the views of parents and carers, as well as teachers and other stakeholders.
